Valero has submitted plans for a proposed £100 million investment to build a Combined Heat and Power (CHP) Cogeneration Unit at Pembroke Refinery. The 45 megawatt unit under review by Valero will provide power to the refinery, as well as supplement the refinery's steam demand.

The CHP project is expected to result in primary energy savings compared to the separate production of heat and electricity. It is also expected to reduce the refinery's operational costs and improve its energy security, helping maintain the refinery's longterm viability and secure future jobs in the Welsh refining industry.

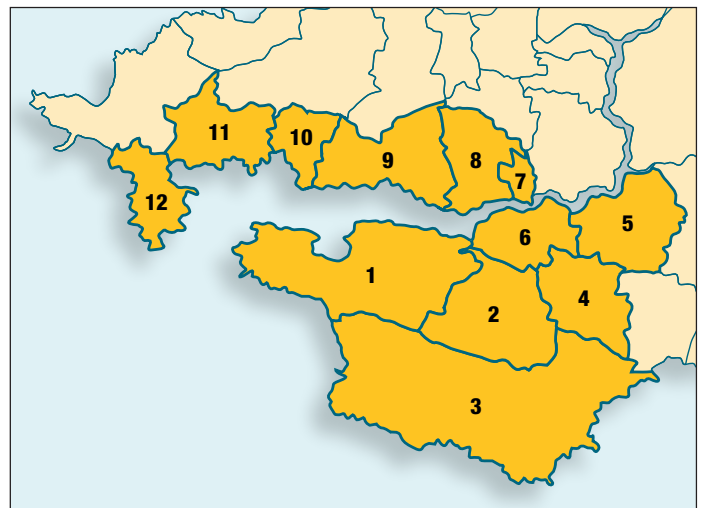
As the project is a Development of National Significance (DNS), Valero is required to consult with key stakeholders and members of the community during a statutory 6 week period prior to final submission of our application. Engaging with local residents and our communities

and keeping them up to date with our plans as they develop is a top priority for Valero, and during this Pre Application period we aim to consult widely with key stakeholders and the public above and beyond what is expected in the DNS regulations.

Building on Valero's existing positive relationship with our local communities, we want to make sure stakeholders are informed about our proposals, obtain feedback from them and address any questions and concerns raised. This is our **Stakeholder Engagement Commitment** which sets out how Valero intends to actively consult with local communities and stakeholders on our CHP project in each Phase.

This is Phase 1

During the course of the project we will be engaging with communities in the vicinity of the project who may be impacted during the construction and operation of the CHP unit.



These communities form part of the project's Consultation Zone.

These include the following communities: Angle(1); Hundleton(2); Stackpole & Castlemartin(3); Pembroke(4); Coshleston(5); Pembroke Dock(6); Neyland(7); Llanstadwell(8); Milford Haven(9); Herbrandston(10); St Ishmaels(11) and Dale(12).



Stakeholder Engagement Commitment

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We want to hear your views and keep you up to date.
This is how we will do that.

Phase 1 Introducing the Project

Phase 1 focuses on introducing the overall project to stakeholders and communities. This includes:

- Press release to the media announcing the project application.
- Introducing the project to members of Valero's Community Advisory Panel liaison committee.
- Meeting with Town and Community Councillors in the Consultation Zone to explain next steps.

Phase 2 Informing Stakeholders

In Phase 2 we will provide stakeholders and communities with more detailed information on the project. This includes:

- Further newsletters to residents in the Consultation Zone providing updates on project developments.
- Engagement with elected representatives at local authority, National Assembly and UK Parliament levels for communities in the Consultation Zone.
- A website publicising project information where people can ask questions and make comments.

Phase 3 Statutory Consultation

Phase 3 represents the statutory 6 week consultation period. This includes:

- Community Open Days, advertised in advance, with displays and other information on the project, open to the public.
- Project notice published in local newspapers.
- Project notice displayed near the project site.
- At the end of the statutory consultation period, Valero will prepare a Consultation Report to be submitted as part of the Development of National Significance process.

As we develop our plans, Valero will be engaging in extensive consultations with statutory consultees, local residents and the general public.
